TO OUR PATRONS.

We have pleasure in presenting the Second Volume of the LAKESIDE ANNUAL DIRECTORY, confident that it will prove even more correct and satisfactory than its predecessor.

The most noteworthy feature of the past year, from a directory standpoint, was the exceptional number of changed locations, particularly in the residence districts.

Several causes combined to produce this result, the chief being the erection of a very large number of desirable new buildings, generally provided with "modern improvements," and therefore very tempting to persons not fully satisfied with their old surroundings.

No little annoyance has been caused by recent changes in the house-numbers of several districts. The reform appears to have been in progress for some time, and prosecuted spasmodically, with little regard to "completing one thing before beginning another." Hence, in many instances while one portion of a street has new numbers, the other retains the old. Again, in other cases, the new numbers have been placed since the canvass was completed. All this occasions confusion, and duplication of numbers, which might have been avoided by a more energetic prosecution of the work. We have taken the utmost pains to secure correctness, and comparatively few errors will be found.

The steady yearly increase in size of our Directory, compels us to adopt a more condensed style of giving names and addresses, restricting each individual to one line of space, whenever practicable. We have also rigidly excluded the large class forming what is known as "the floating population," *i.e.*, persons holding a residence of only a few weeks or months duration. The opening of navigation, and activity of various interests depending upon it, draws hither a very considerable immigration, which remains only during the summer months, and is subject to daily changes during its temporary stay. Hence the classification of an element so variable and transitory, would be of but little value at the time of publishing, and almost useless a month later. It has been customary in Western cities

to include these names, but as they evidently serve no useful purpose we shall continue to omit them.

At the commencement of our canvass we urged business men to bear in mind the importance of giving personal attention to insuring the correctness of their record, when our agents called. The request was very generally complied with, and we trust, in cases where disregarded and errors have crept in, that they will serve as reminders for the future. Perfection is impossible in a work of such magnitude, necessarily intrusted to a very large number of employees, and prosecuted day and night at the utmost speed. Yet so carefully and conscientiously has the labor been performed that where mistakes have unfortunately been made they are almost invariably the result of omission or inaccuracy on the part of those giving the information. We particularly request that when errors are discovered the corrections be sent us promptly by mail, and we will rectify them in our "Business Directory" to be issued January 1, 1876.

And in cases of changes in firm names, locations, new arrivals, etc., occurring after this date, parties interested will find it advantageous to promptly inform us. We shall keep at our office, for the convenience of our subscribers, a Corrected Reference Directory, in which all new names, changes, corrections, etc., will be entered daily. We also have on file copies of the Directories of all important cities and towns, which our subscribers are invited to consult at their pleasure.

Through the courtesy of Henry H. Hurlbut, Esq., we are enabled to present a reprint, and as nearly as possible, *fac simile*, of the first Chicago Directory, issued in 1839. It has never before been reprinted, though a later issue was several years ago incorrectly reproduced, as the first.

We shall hereafter omit from the General Directory, as having no legitimate place therein, the usual review and comparative exhibit of our mercantile, manufacturing and commercial interests. A very full and correct review will be incorporated in our Business Directory, where it properly belongs.

The statistics of our population, however, should rightfully appear in the General Directory, and is therefore appended.

St. Louis claims 113,870 names, but our count shows only 105,701.

Cincinnati claims 105,000, but our count shows 106,677.

These figures are the result of a careful count of the books compared.

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

CITY AND WARD BOUNDARIES.

The corporate limits and jurisdiction of the city of Chicago shall embrace and include, within the same, all of townships 38 and 39, north range 14, and all of sections 2, 11, 12, 13, 14, 23, 24, 25, 26, and the portion of section 32 lying south and west of the center of the Illinois and Michigan canal, in range 13, east of the 3d principal meridian, and that portion of section 30 lying south and west of the center of the north branch of the Chicago river, and all of sections 31, 32, 33, and fractional section 34, in township 40, north range 14, east of the third principal meridian, together with the portion of the eastern and bed of Lake Michigan as lies within one mile of the shore thereof, and east of the territory aforesaid.

NORTH DIVISION—All that portion of the aforesaid territory lying north of the center of the main Chicago river and east of the center of the north branch of said river shall constitute the North Division of said city.

SOUTH DIVISION—All that portion of the aforesaid territory lying south of the center of the main Chicago river and south and east of the center of the south branch of said river, and of the Illinois and Michigan canal, shall constitute the South Division of said city.

WEST DIVISION—All that portion of the aforesaid territory lying west of the center of the north and south branches of said river and of the Illinois and Michigan canal, shall constitute the West Division of said city.

Ward Boundaries.

First Ward—All that part of the South Division which lies south of the center of the main Chicago river and north of the center of Monroe.

Second Ward—All that part of the South Division which lies south of the center of Monroe and north of the center of Harrison.

Third Ward—All that part of the South Division which lies south of the center of Harrison and north of the center of Sixteenth.

Fourth Ward—All that part of the South Division which lies south of the center of Sixteenth, and east of the center of Clark, and a line corresponding with the center of the last named st., projected southerly to the city limits.

Fifth Ward—All that part of the South Division which lies south of the center of Twenty-sixth, and east of the center of Clark, and a line corresponding with the center of the last named st., projected southerly to the city limits.

Sixth Ward—All that part of the South Division which lies south of the center of Sixteenth and west of the center of Clark, and a line corresponding with the center of the last named st., projected southerly to the city limits.

Seventh Ward—All that part of the West Division which lies south of the center of Sixteenth.

Eighth Ward—All that part of the West Division which lies north of the center of Sixteenth and south of the center of Twelfth.

Ninth Ward—All that part of the West Division

which lies north of the center of Twelfth, east of the center of Loomis, and south of the center of VanBuren.

Tenth Ward—All that part of the West Division which lies north of the center of VanBuren, east of the center of Aberdeen and Curtis, and south to the center of Randolph.

Eleventh Ward—All that part of the West Division which lies north of the center of Randolph east of the center of Curtis, and south of the center of Ohio (4th).

Twelfth Ward—All that part of the West Division which lies north of the center of Twelfth, east of the center of Ashland av., south of the center of Ohio (4th) and west of the following boundary, viz.: commencing at the center of Clark, thence running thence to the center of Curtis and Aberdeen, to the center of VanBuren; thence west on the road from VanBuren to the center of Loomis; thence south on the center of Loomis to the center of Twelfth.

Thirteenth Ward—All that part of the West Division which lies north of the center of Twelfth west of the center of Ashland av., and south of the center of Lake.

Fourteenth Ward—All that part of the West Division which lies north of the center of Lake and south of the center of Chicago av., and west of the center of Ashland av.

Fifteenth Ward—All that part of the West Division which lies north of the center of Ohio (4th) and Chicago av., not included in any of the foregoing wards.

Sixteenth Ward—All that part of the North Division which lies north of the center of North av.

Seventeenth Ward—All that part of the North Division which lies south of the center of North av. and north of the center of Division.

Eighteenth Ward—All that part of the North Division which lies south of the center of Division and west of the center of Franklin.

Nineteenth Ward—All that part of the North Division which lies south of the center of Franklin and north of the center of Chicago av.

Twentieth Ward—All that part of the North Division which lies south of the center of Chicago av. and east of the center of Franklin.

HACK ORDINANCE.

The price to be charged by the owner or owners, or drivers, or of any hackney coach, carriage or vehicle for the conveyance of passengers, except omnibus, for hire within the city of Chicago, shall be as follows, to be regulated and estimated by the distance on the most direct routes, namely:

For conveying each passenger from one railroad depot to another railroad depot, fifty cents.

For conveying each passenger not exceeding one mile, fifty cents.

For conveying a passenger any distance over one mile and less than two miles, one dollar.

For conveying each additional passenger of the same family or party, fifty cents.

For conveying a passenger in said city any distance exceeding two miles, one dollar and fifty cents.

For each additional passenger of the same family or party, fifty cents.

For conveying children between five and fourteen years of age, half of the above rates may be charged for like distance, but for children under five years of age no charge shall be made. Provided, that the distance from any railroad depot, steamboat landing or hotel, to any other railroad depot, steamboat landing or hotel, shall in all cases be estimated as not exceeding one mile.

For the use by day of any hackney coach or other vehicle drawn by two horses or other animals, with carriage and piazza, eight dollars per day.

For the use of any such carriage or vehicle by the hour, with one or more passengers, with the privilege of going from place to place, and stopping as often as may be required, as follows: For the first hour, two dollars; for each additional hour or part of an hour, one dollar.

For conveying one or more passengers to or from a place in said city, between the hours of twelve o'clock midnight and 7 a.m., for each trip, without regard to distance or number of passengers, two dollars.

For the use of any cab, or other vehicle drawn by one horse or other animal, by the hour, with the privilege of going from place to place, with one or more passengers, and stopping when required: For the first hour, one dollar; for each additional hour or part of an hour, fifty cents.

For the use of any such carriage by the day, four dollars.

Every passenger shall be allowed to have conveyed upon such vehicle, without charge, his ordinary traveling baggage, not exceeding in any case one trunk and twenty-five pounds of other baggage. For every additional package, where the weight or weight, or baggage is over one hundred pounds, if conveyed to any place within the city limits, the owner or driver shall be permitted to charge fifteen cents.

Rates of Postage.

The single letter rate of postage is THREE CENTS throughout the United States for half ounce or under.

An additional rate of THREE CENTS is required for each additional half ounce or fraction thereof. The postage on letters dropped in the office for delivery in the city is two cents per half ounce, PREPAID by stamps. Transient newspaper pamphlets, proof-sheets, book manuscripts, samples, blank cards, drawings, envelopes, seeds, roots, cions, maps, printed matter, circulars and books, will be rated at one cent for every ounce or fraction thereof, PREPAID by stamps.

Unmailable Letters.

By the instructions under the postal laws, unmailable letters are specified to be: Letters attempted to be sent with stamps previously used, or stamps cut from stamped envelopes. Unpaid letters from foreign countries, on which payment is required by the regulations. Letters not addressed or so badly addressed that their destination can not be known. Letters not directed to places where there are no post offices. Civilian's letters (domestic) wholly unpaid. (Including unpaid drop letters). Only such letters as are herein described are, when deposited in any post office, to be forwarded to the next post office; all others must be dispatched to their destination, charged with the amount of undpaid postage. When unpayable letters are sent to the dead letter office, the specific reason therefor must be indorsed upon the envelope of each.

THE FOLLOWING CLASSES OF LETTERS ARE NOT ADVERTISED: Drop letters, Box-letters, Letters directed and sent to hotels, and thence returned to the post office as unclaimed. Letters turned from the dead letter office to writers. Circulars, free packets, containing printed documents, speeches and other printed matter.

U. S. Postal Money Order System.

MONEY SENT WITHOUT DANGER OF LOSS.

The Money Order system is intended to promote public convenience and to insure safety in the transmission through the mails of small sums of money. The mode by which safety is secured consists in leaving out of the order the name of the payee or payees, whom the money is intended to protect; a money order differs from an ordinary bank draft or check. An notice of identification, containing full particulars of the order, is transmitted by the issuing postmaster to the postmaster at the office of payment. The latter is thus furnished, before the order itself can be presented, with the necessary information to detect fraud, if any should be attempted.

No applicant, however, can obtain in one day more than three orders payable at the same office and to the same payee.

INTERNATIONAL MONEY ORDER SYSTEM.

Orders can be obtained upon any money order offices in the kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for any sum not exceeding \$50 in United States currency.

Registry Department.

Letters can be registered to all parts of the United States upon payment of a fee of eight cents, in addition to the regular postage.

Postal Rules.

Many errors occur by persons not observing the following regulations in depositing letters, papers or manuscripts, publications, in the office for mailing.

All drop letters must be prepaid by postage stamps at the rate of two cents for each half ounce or fraction thereof, at all offices where the free delivery system is established.

Prepayment by stamps required on all letters to places within the United States.

Letters addressed to initials and fictitious persons are not mailed unless directed to be delivered at designated places, or to call on a certain person or firm within the delivery of the office to which they are addressed, must be returned, at the end of each month, to the dead letter office.

Full prepayment by stamps required on all transient printed matter, foreign and domestic.

Insert the county in which the office is located, upon all letters; many errors in superscription may thus be avoided, and the risk of mailing being avoided.

The vast increase in the mail demand and this.

Persons calling for letters, other than themselves, must present a written order therefor.

Samples and packages containing poisons, oils, explosive chemicals, liquids, or anything calculated to injure or endanger the safety of the mails, will not be received.

Variable letters should in all cases be registered; and when this is done, if to be transmitted, a postal money order (to secure safety in transmission) should be obtained when practicable.

Persons presenting drafts drawn by the post office department upon the postmaster of the city, will be required to identify themselves before payment is made.

Cashiers of banks and agents of express companies, having post office drafts for collection, will please leave their official signatures with the cashier of this office, to enable him to verify their endorsements and save delay.

The public are requested to inform the postmaster of any inattention to their duties on the part of the carriers or the clerks in the office.

Employees of this office, while on duty, cannot be seen except on official business.

Stamped Envelopes.

The attention of the public is called to the advantages of using stamped envelopes rather than postage stamps. Daily numbers of letters are dropped in the post office, without prepayment, with revenue stamps and stamps cut from stamped envelopes affixed, which are held for postage; whereas by the use of stamped envelopes, these letters would go forward without delay. Persons purchasing stamp envelopes, for remittance, in quantities of five hundred and upwards, may have their business card and request to return in a specified time printed thereon, not to exceed four lines, free of charge.

City Delivery.

Free delivery of letters by faithful carriers will be secured by having the letters addressed to the street and number. Persons calling for mail at the carriers' department of this office on Sundays or holidays, will please give the number of the carrier for the district, and the name of the applicant or firm inquired for.

Head letters with the names of the writers, post office and state, street and number, sign them with full address, and request that answers be directed accordingly. Persons owning boxes, can receive their mail at their places of business or residence by leaving an order in the business office. The value of the free delivery system cannot be too highly estimated. It is more regular, more secure, and more convenient than the box system. Many letters pass through the mails, reach this city, are deposited in the boxes, and because of the divided responsibility, fail to reach the firm or family addressed.

The carriers are under bonds for an honest discharge of their duties. If the business community could be induced to cease sending boys to the post office for their mail matter, and accept the means provided by the department for a safe delivery of letters through responsible carriers, a great evil would be eradicated, and many losses (now occurring) prevented.

The public are requested to adopt the house-door letter boxes, the use of which will result in greatly increasing rapidity in the delivery of letters.

It is hoped that those householders who have not hitherto provided letter boxes will not object to doing so, as by that means, at a very moderate expense, they will secure the convenience both of themselves and their neighbors, and at the same time render an important aid to the public welfare.

N. B.—A request for the return of a letter to the writer if unclaimed within thirty days or less, written or printed with the writer's name, post office and state, across the left hand side of the envelope, on the face side, will be complied with. Letters bearing such endorsements will be returned to the writer free of postage.

Railway Post Offices.

Railway post offices are established on all Western lines from Chicago (excepting the Milwaukee railway). These offices run upon morning trains, and letters may be mailed at the cars up to the moment prior to the departure of the trains. Stamps of the denominations of two, three and ten cents may be had at the cars.

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
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
