In adjoining column showing the sizes of the different bodies, and their proportions to each other by twelfths of Pica, the present Pica being the standard.

Each size is a factor. Three Nonpareils (6) are a Great Primer (18); Three Breviers (8) are a Double Pica (24); a Nonpareil (6) and a Brevier (8) are an English (14) or Two Line Minion; a Pica (12) and an Excelsior (4)—two six-to-Pica leads—are a Columbian (16); a Double English (28) and a Brevier (8) are a Double Great Primer (36); so with all of the other sizes, making the combination of two or more sizes of type in a word, or line, the simplest thing imaginable in composition. That odd body, Bourgeois (9), is now a respectable size, being a Nonpareil (6) and one-half exactly.

Look over the figures and test the simplicity of the new system of Type bodies.

OUR POPULATION.

A Directory gives only representative names, while a Census enumeration should show every person. For example: John Jones is the only name returned from 520 ——— street, in the Directory, while in the Census report 520 ——— street is credited with *John Jones, Mrs. John Jones, Charlie, Emma, James, and John jr.* (children), and *Mary Johnson* (Mrs. Jones' servant), in all seven names.

Hence in computing the population from the names given in Directories, an allowance must be made for the persons attached to the households of the names printed. It is difficult to fix the just allowance so to be made, and the ratio varies in different cities, from five in the older Eastern cities and villages to three and one-half or three in the Western cities, and even two and one-half or two in the newer frontier cities and towns.

It has been customary in Chicago, St. Louis, Cincinnati, etc., to multiply the Directory names by three and one-half in estimating the population, which multiple has been found to produce practically correct results. Applying this test to the names found in this and last year's Directories, we obtain the following:

The United States Census, taken this year, is not completed as we go to press; but 480,000 names are thus far returned, with a number of districts yet to be canvassed. The enumeration, however, is arbitrarily confined within the corporate limits, which by no means represent the actual extent of the city. For example: the Union Stock Yards, with their immense business, adjoin the city limits, and are credited as a part of Chicago everywhere except in the United States Census. Outside of the city limits the streets are continuously and solidly built up, the residents being, practically, a part of its population. In addition to this, many persons doing business in the city have their residences in the various suburbs, coming and going daily. They are actually citizens of Chicago, and as such have their names in the Directory. In view of these facts, we deem our estimate of 596,000 souls, as given above, to be the present population of Chicago.

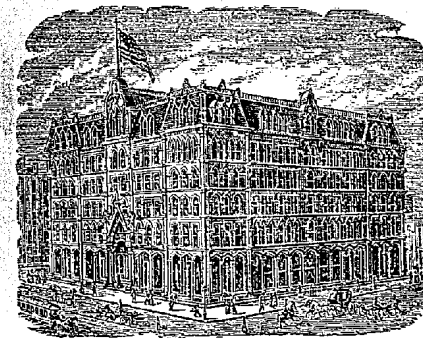

CITY AND WARD BOUNDARIES.

The corporate limits and jurisdiction of the city of Chicago, shall embrace and include, within the same, all of township 39, north range 14, and all of sections 1, 2, 11, 12, 13, 14, 23, 24, 25, 26, and that portion of sections 35 and 36 lying north and west of the center of the Illinois and Michigan canal, in range 18, east of the 3d principal meridian, and

that portion of section 30 lying south and west of the center of the north branch of the Chicago river, and all of sections 31, 32, 33, and fractional section 34, in township 40, north range 14, east of the third principal meridian, together with so much of the waters and bed of Lake Michigan as lies within one mile of the shore thereof, and east of the territory aforesaid.

NORTH DIVISION—All that portion of the aforesaid territory lying south of the center of the main Chicago river and east of the center of the north branch of said river, shall constitute the North Division of said city.

SOUTH DIVISION—All that portion of the aforesaid territory lying south of the center of the main Chicago river, and south and east of the center of the south branch of said river, and of the Illinois and Michigan canal, shall constitute the South Division of said city.

WEST DIVISION—All that portion of the aforesaid territory lying west of the center of the north and south branches of said river and of the Illinois and Michigan canal, shall constitute the West Division of said city.

Ward Boundaries.

First Ward—All that part of the South Division of said city which lies south of the center of the main Chicago river and north of the center of Harrison street, shall be denominated the First Ward.

Second Ward—All that part of the South Division of said city which lies south of the center of Harrison street and north of the center of Sixteenth, shall be denominated the Second Ward.

Third Ward—All that part of the South Division of said city which lies south of the center of Sixteenth and east of the center of Clark, and a line corresponding to the center of the last named street, projected southerly to the center of Twenty-sixth, and north of the center of said Twenty-sixth, and a line corresponding with the center of the last named street projected easterly to Lake Michigan, shall be denominated the Third Ward.

Fourth Ward—All that part of the South Division of said city which lies south of the center of Twenty-sixth, and a line corresponding with the center of said street projected easterly to Lake Michigan, and east of the center of Clark, and a line corresponding with the center of the last named street projected southerly to the city limits, shall be denominated the Fourth Ward.

Fifth Ward—All that part of the South Division of said city which lies south of the center of Sixteenth and west of the center of Clark, and a line corresponding with the center of the last named street then projected southerly to the city limits, shall be denominated the Fifth Ward.

Sixth Ward—All that part of the West Division of said city which lies south of the center of Sixteenth and south of the center of Twelfth, shall be denominated the Sixth Ward.

Seventh Ward—All that part of the West Division of said city which lies north of the center of Sixteenth and south of Twelfth, shall be denominated the Seventh Ward.

Eighth Ward—All that part of the West Division of said city which lies north of the center of Twelfth, east of the center of Loomis, and south of the center of VanBuren, shall be denominated the Eighth Ward.

Ninth Ward—All that part of the West Division of said city which lies north of the center of VanBuren, east of the center of Aberdeen and Curtis, and south of the center of Randolph, shall be denominated the Ninth Ward.

Tenth Ward—All that part of the West Division of said city which lies north of the center of Randolph, east of the center of Curtis, and south of the center of West Ohio, shall be denominated the Tenth Ward.

Eleventh Ward—All that part of the West Division of said city which lies north of the center of Twelfth, east of the center of Ashland, south of the center of West Ohio, and west of the following boundary, viz.: Commencing at the center of West Ohio, running thence south on the center of Curtis and Aberdeen to the center of VanBuren; thence west on the center of VanBuren to the center of Loomis to the center of Twelfth, shall be denominated the Eleventh Ward.

Twelfth Ward—All that part of the West Division of said city which lies north of the center of Twelfth, west of the center of Ashland, and south of the center of Lake, shall be denominated the Twelfth Ward.

Thirteenth Ward—All that part of the West Division of said city which lies north of the center of Lake, south of the center of Chicago av., and west of the center of Ashland av., shall be denominated the Thirteenth Ward.

Fourteenth Ward—All that part of the West Division of said city which lies west of the center of West Ohio and Chicago av., and included in any of the foregoing wards, shall be denominated the Fourteenth Ward.

Fifteenth Ward—All that part of the North Division of said city which lies north of the center of North av., shall be denominated the Fifteenth Ward.

Sixteenth Ward—All that part of the North Divi-

sion of said city which lies south of the center of North av. and north of the center of Division, shall be denominated the Sixteenth Ward.

Seventeenth Ward—All that part of the North Division of said city which lies south of the center of Division and west of the center of Franklin shall be denominated the Seventeenth Ward.

Eighteenth Ward—All that part of the North Division of said city which lies south of Division and east of center of Franklin shall be denominated the Eighteenth Ward.

HACK ORDINANCE.

The price to be charged by the owner or owners, or drivers, of any hackney coach, carriage or vehicle for the conveyance of passengers, except omnibuses, for hire within the city of Chicago, shall be as follows, to be regulated and estimated by the distance on the most direct routes, namely:

For conveying each passenger from one railroad depot to another railroad depot, fifty cents.

For conveying each passenger not exceeding one mile, fifty cents.

For conveying a passenger any distance over one mile and less than two miles, one dollar.

For conveying each additional passenger of the same family or party, fifty cents.

For conveying a passenger in said city any distance not exceeding two miles, one dollar and fifty cents.

For each additional passenger of the same family or party, fifty cents.

For conveying children between five and fourteen years of age, half the above rates may be charged for like distances; but for children under five years of age no charge shall be made. Provided that the distance from any railroad depot, steamboat landing or hotel, to any other railroad depot, steamboat landing or hotel, shall in all cases be estimated as not exceeding one mile.

For the use by the day of any hackney coach or other vehicle drawn by two horses or other animals, with one or more passengers, eight dollars per day.

For the use of any such carriage or vehicle by the hour, with one or more passengers with the privilege of going from place to place, and stopping at any place, shall be required, as follows: For the first hour two dollars; for each additional hour or part of an hour, one dollar.

For conveying one or more passengers to or from any place in said city, between the hours of twelve o'clock midnight and 7 a. m., for each trip, without regard to distance or number of passengers, two dollars.

For the use of any cab, or other vehicle drawn by one horse or other animal, by the hour, with the privilege of going from place to place, with one or more passengers, and stopping when required: For the first hour, one dollar; for each additional hour or part of an hour, fifty cents.

For the use of any such carriage by the day, four dollars.

Every passenger shall be allowed to have conveyed upon such vehicle, without charge, his ordinary traveling baggage, not exceeding in any case one trunk, and twenty-five pounds of other baggage, and every additional package, where the whole weight of baggage is over one hundred pounds, if conveyed to any place within the city limits, the owner or driver shall be permitted to charge fifteen cents.

Registry Department.

Letters can be registered to all parts of the United States upon payment of a fee of ten cents, in addition to the regular postage.

Postal Rules.

Many errors occur by persons not observing the following regulations in depositing letters, papers, or miscellaneous publications, in the office for mailing.

Drop letters must be prepaid by postage stamps at the rate of two cents for each half ounce or fraction thereof, at all offices where the free delivery system is established.

Prepayment by stamps required on all letters to places within the United States.

Letters addressed to initials and fictitious persons and firms, unless directed to be delivered to a designated place, or to the care of a certain person or firm, within the delivery of the office to which they are addressed, must be returned, at the end of each month, to the post office.

Full prepayment by stamps required on all transient printed matter, foreign and domestic.

Insert the county in which the office is located, upon all letters; many errors in superscription may thus be detected, and mistakes in mailing be avoided. The vast increase in the mails demand this.

Persons calling for letters for others than themselves, must present a written order therefor.

Samples of packages containing poisons, oils, explosive chemicals, fluids, sharp instruments, sugar, glass, flour, soap, or anything calculated to injure or endanger the safety of the mails, will not be received.

Valuable letters should in all cases be registered; and when money is designed to be transmitted, a postal money order (to secure safety in transmission) should be obtained when practicable.

Persons presenting drafts drawn by the post-office department upon the postmaster of the city, will be required to identify themselves before payment is made.

Cashiers of banks, and agents of express companies, holding post-office drafts for collection, will please leave their official signatures with the cashier of this office, to enable him to verify their endorsements and save delay.

The public are requested to inform the postmaster of any inattention to their duties on the part of the carriers or the clerks in the office.

Employees of this office, while on duty, can not be seen except on official business.

Stamped Envelopes.

The attention of the public is called to the advantages of using stamped envelopes rather than postage stamps. Daily numbers of letters are dropped in the post-office, without prepayment, with revenue stamps and stamps cut from stamped envelopes affixed, which are held for postage, whereas, by the use of stamped envelopes, these letters would go forward without delay.

Special Request Envelopes are furnished by the Department, in quantities of 500 and upward, with the name and address of the writer printed upon the upper left hand corner without additional charge.

City Delivery.

Free delivery of letters by faithful carriers will be secured by having the letters addressed to the

street and number. Persons calling for mail at the carriers' department of this office on Sundays, or holidays, will please give the number of the carrier for the district, and the name of the applicant or firm inquired for.

Head letters with the names of the writers, post-office and state, street and number, sign them with full name, and request that answers be directed accordingly.

Parties now owning boxes can receive their mail at their places of business or residence by leaving an order in the business office. The advantages of the free delivery system can not be too highly estimated. It is more regular, more secure, and more convenient than the box system.

Many letters pass through the mails, reach this city, are deposited in the boxes, and because of the divided responsibility, fail to reach the parties addressed.

The carriers are under bonds for the honest discharge of their duties. If the business community could be induced to cease sending boys to the post-office for their mail matter, and accept the means provided by the department, for a safe delivery of letters, through responsible carriers, a great evil would be corrected and many losses prevented.

The public are requested to adopt the post-door letter boxes, the use of which will result in greatly increasing rapidly in the delivery of letters.

It is hoped that those householders who have not hitherto provided letter boxes will not object to doing so, as by that means, at a very moderate expense, they can promote the convenience both of themselves and their neighbors, and at the same time render an important aid to the public service.

N.B. A request for a letter to the writer if unclaimed within thirty days or less, written or printed with the writer's name, post-office and state, across the left hand side of the envelope, bearing such endorsements will be returned to the writer free of postage.

Railway Post-Offices.

Railway post-offices are established on all western lines from Chicago (excepting the Chicago & Pacific R.R.). Those offices run on connecting trains, and letters may be mailed at the cars up to the moment prior to the departure of the trains. Stamps of the denominations of two, three and ten cents may be had at the cars.

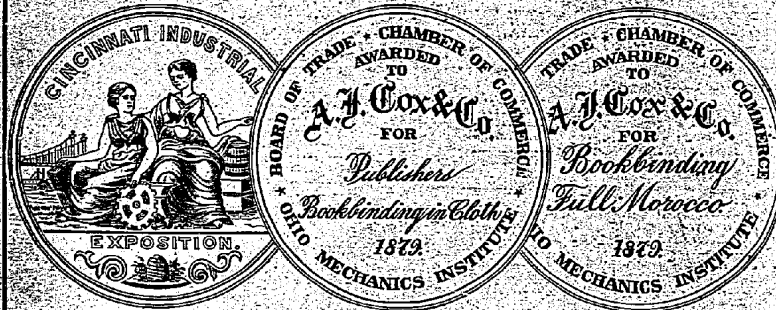

STREET AND AVENUE GUIDE.

EXPLANATORY.

The City comprises Three Grand Divisions, known as the North, South, and West Divisions. State street is the main artery to the South Division. North Clark street is the main artery to the North Division. Madison, Randolph, and Lake streets are the main arteries to the West Division. On any given street, the relative location of a particular place or house is got by running down the column of figures, which are its numbers at the several crossings of the streets that intersect it. For example, to find 44 State, it will be seen that 30 is on the corner of Lake, and 66 on the corner of Randolph; hence, 44 is between these two streets. Where no numbers are given, the corners, and often the blocks are vacant, or occupied by a house or manufactory not numbered.
